- (j) Mr. Biswas's inauspicious' childhood.
- (k) Why is Biswas always confronting Tulsi's?
- (1) Legacy of experience left behind by Biswas.
- 2. Discuss in detail Roskolinikov's theory about the 'ordinary' vs the 'extraordinary' man. Does it have a wider context?

OR

'Most characters-male and female-suffer from abnormality and psychic turmoil in 'Crime and Punishment'. Discuss.

3. 'Old Man and the Sea signifies man's unrelenting struggle and grit in the face of odds'. Elaborate.

OR

'Old Man and the Sea qualifies to be more than mere fiction-it is a parable, an allegory of many variations'. Discuss.

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4. Compare the female narrator's search for true identity, paralleled by search for Canadian national identity.

OR

How are the overall personal/social/existential concerns in *surfacing* equated with ecology?

5. 'Achebe wrote a new historiography of his culture and history, rejecting colonial versions in *Things Fale Apart*'. Discuss.

OR

Elaborate Okonkwo's character by pointing out his weak and strong traits.

6. 'Dislocation, dereliction, deprivation - these inform Mr Biswas's struggles in A House for Mr Biswas.

OR

Do you think, at the end of the novel, Biswas remains an 'ordinary', unsuccessful man?

7. Critically discuss the richness of historis and cultures portrayed in World Fiction.
